

As hard as it is to admit, sometimes I'm easily offended. Ok, I can hear many you saying, "Oh no she didn't!" It's easy to blame others when we get hurt. But the truth is, we have control over our emotions. God gave us the ability to choose whether we want to feel offended. Much like forgiveness is a choice, not being easily offended is also a choice.

There was a time when I had to make this choice at work. At this time, I looked forward to the company's new hire coming on board. But unfortunately from day one, she made comments toward me that left me feeling ... well, offended.

As a result of both her actions and the way I chose to respond, we frequently butted heads. This caused our team to be less cohesive than it could have been. One day, I learned that the new hire recently had been injured. In the moment, I had to make a decision. Was I willing to extend grace to her despite how I felt I had been treated? The choice was clear. Therefore, a colleague and I scrambled to take care of some her business matters. We picked up the slack while she recovered. A short while later, my boss asked me why I had helped the new hire, despite the way she treated me and others. I replied to my boss that I behaved the way I had, "because love covers a multitude of sins (*1 Peter 4:8*)."

My response to the perceived offense, comes from *The New Message Bible's* interpretation of the *1 Peter* texts which explains that love forgives and disregards the offenses of others. Although, I thought that I had every reason to be offended, the Lord pressed upon my heart that I had an opportunity to be kind. As a result, the relationship improved so that things became more professional. I extended grace to her, by treating her how I would want to be treated. I worked hard to let go of the offenses and integrate the words of *1 Peter 4:8* into my life. And it worked!

Jesus's love is reflected through His experience upon the cross. Jesus's love covers a multitude of our sins. We must allow the outpouring of His grace to overflow from us and extend that same measure of grace to those who we encounter in life who offend us. We must choose to turn our, "Oh no she didn't!" into, "Oh yes He did!"

Recently, I had to say, "I am sorry, please forgive me that was not my intentions," again. This was my prayer:

Dear Lord, I'm sorry for how I've offended others. I ask that you reveal to me if there's anyone I need to make peace with. At the same time, show me when and how to let go of offenses against me. Help me learn to be a better parent, sibling, leader, neighbor and friend. When someone offends me, enable me to give that person grace in the same way that you've shown me grace. May I respond in a way that helps my relationships, rather than harm them. In Jesus Name I pray!



UPDATE FROM THE ECONOMIC READINESS TEAM

Historically the African Methodist Episcopal Church engaged in economic development. Throughout the years, this wealth building, began over two centuries ago by our Founder, Bishop Richard Allen served as stepping stones to revenue streams that allowed the AME Church to establish colleges, seminaries, K-12 schools, affordable housing, outreach centers, houses of worship, shopping centers. Revenues from these institutions advanced social justice, supported ministries to the least of these, built hospitals, and created a better future for congregants and the communities we serve.

This same belief is the driving force behind the vision to create innovative funding streams. An Economic Readiness Team (ERT) led by Rev. Dr. Lee P. Washington, explores several creative options to increase cash flow into the District above and beyond assessments paid by our churches. After deliberation the ERT determined the best way to increase our wealth was through purchasing property because property value appreciate and produce income.

Based upon their review and recommendation, we intend to purchase two properties. Monies generated from these purchases will immediately reduce the assessments for 50 churches and another 50 when the second purchase is completed. Our long-term vision is that all churches in the Second District will have their assessments substantially reduced or paid completely. We are in the process of finalizing the contract for the first property and intend to complete purchase of the second within 8 months.



To achieve this goal, we need to raise \$1.5 million.





At the site of the Annual Conference this year, ministerial and lay will be elected to serve as delegates for the General Conference 2020. This General Conference is the 51st Quadrennial Session that will be held in Orlando, Florida, July 8-15, 2020. The main function of the General Conference will be to pass legislation that affects the Church and will become law and included in the Doctrine and Discipline of the A.M.E. Church; review and passing of the budget; retire, elect and assign Bishops to the twenty Episcopal Districts. Please refer to the current Doctrine and Discipline of the A.M.E. Church, 2016 edition, page 247 for additional information.

As we, the Western North Carolina Conference go to our Annual Conference session from April 30, 2019, to May 4, 2019, the election for the delegation will be held on the designated day and time.

Ministerial delegates shall be elected by the itinerant ministers of the Annual Conference, provided they are in good and regular standing at the time of the election. The ministerial election and the Lay Electoral College shall be held on the same date, in the same city, at a different place, at the same time.

The Lay Electoral College (see Page 251 of the A.M.E. Church Discipline)

The Electoral College shall be composed of one (1) adult and one (1) young adult between the ages of 18 and 35, in good and regular standing, from each station, circuit and mission in the Annual Conference, whose expenses to the College are paid by the station, circuit or mission represented.

The adult lay delegate from the local church hosting the meeting of the Electoral College shall take the chair for the purpose of presiding and processing the voting to elect a temporary chairperson and temporary secretary. After the devotional service, the College shall elect a permanent organization, electing a chairperson, secretary, two tellers and two clerks and then proceed to elect from the members by ballot delegates; at least one must be young adult between 18 and 35 years of age and alternates, as provided by law **under the caption "Composition of the General Conference" (see Part XIV, Section I**-A. Once the election is completed, the secretary will provide the names and contact information of those elected to the Presiding Bishop and the Secretary of the Annual Conference.

<u>Delegates</u>

Delegates are expected to attend all business sessions, vote when needed to do so and serve on committees as assigned and attend the meetings that the Second Episcopal District will be having (usually after the general sessions have ended). Delegates are expected to be team players.

Funds will be provided by the District and the Conference to help with the cost to cover your room, meals, travel and other incidentals but may not cover all expenses.

Please do not forget to take your medications with you and take them as prescribed. A medical station served by nurses is usually available. Remember to take the Bible and the Book of Discipline.

<u>Alternates</u>

Alternate delegates will be elected to serve in the absence of the delegates. There is a first alternate who will be treated as the delegates as it may relate to expenses. Other alternates usually receive some funds once they have attended and served for a designated number of days.

Observers

Observers planning to attend the General Conference must register. They will receive kits and there will be reserved seating for them. You may attend the District meetings and other events. Observers are not required to attend all business sessions.

Must attend college or university in the Fall of 2019.

The J.D. Williams Scholarship was established by the Connectional Lay Organization for the purpose of assisting young men and women in obtaining a college education. The funds for the scholarship will be administered by the Connectional Lay Organization of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. This scholarship is designated for a student planning to attend a four year A.M.E. college, university, or seminary.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

A member of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. Must attend an A.M.E. college, university, or seminary in the Fall of 2019. Pursue course of study leading to a Bachelor's Degree, M. Div, or D. Min.

The Joseph C. McKinney Scholarship was established by the Connectional Lay Organization for the purpose of assisting young men and women of the Christian Faith in the African Methodist Episcopal Church in obtaining a college education. The funds for this scholarship will be administered by the Connectional Lay Organization of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

A member of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

The scholarship will be given to an individual who desires to serve the A.M.E. Church in a leadership capacity.

Must be a 2019 high school graduate

Pursue course of study leading to a Bachelor's Degree.

THE SELECTION PROCESS





The first church on the site where Turner's Chapel AME church graveyard is today was built by a Methodist minister named Thomas Barnum and named Barnum's Chapel. Barnum's Chapel was established sometime prior to the start of the Civil War as a place of worship for all denominations.

Sometime later the Barnum Chapel property was purchased by a black congregation, and the first AME church on this site was established. The name was changed from Barnum's Chapel to Turner's Chapel A.M.E This name was chosen in honor of our 12th Bishop Henry Turner.

The first pastor of Turner's Chapel was Reverend J.P. Chalmers. The first trustees were Samuel Pearson, Thomas M. Cole, W.R. Raper, J.W. Joyner and Thomas Fuller. The choir was organized by J.R. Reeder with Henry Jeffers, Fannie Palmer and Lucille Raper as early members.

In 1921, the second Turner's Chapel was constructed, and the pastor was P.H. Holt. The funds necessary for the financing were obtained primarily by W.P. Raper and Carl Charles. These determined and dedicated members had mortgages placed in their own property to finance the new church. This building served the community until 1955.

In 1955, the cornerstone was laid for third and present church under the leadership of Reverend M.L. Johnson. Reverend Johnson served Turner's Chapel for 23 years until 1973.

In 1974, Revered C.C. Scott, Jr., was named Pastor he served approximately one year. In 1975, Reverend J.L. White pastored Turner's for 5 faithful years. Under his leadership, the church sanctuary was remodeled and the first public address was given. The church got its first central air conditioning system installed. The plans were made to add an educational building and a fellowship hall. Under the leadership of Reverend J.L. White a very dynamic gospel was organized which helped promote and increased in church attendance and membership.

In 1980, Reverend A.M Hall became pastor. He continued working on the plans for the fellowship hall. Under his leadership the first male chorus was formed. Rev. Hall served Turner's Chapel for 5 years. In 1985, under the leadership of Reverend W.H. Morrison's ministry, the first fellowship hall was built. In addition to the fellowship hall, his love of young people helped foster the beginning of a strong youth ministry. Reverend Morrison served faithfully until 1991.



Turner's Chapel History (cont'd)

In May 1991, Reverend William E. Diggs was appointed pastor of Turner's Chapel. He was successful in promoting, spiritual, physical, and financial growth. His rapport with the youth exemplified qualities of a true servant of God. Under his leadership, community and fellowship for churches of all denominations thrived together in Jamestown, High Point, and especially in the Florence community was possible.

Under Reverend W.E. Diggs's leadership the old sanctuary was remolded with updated seating, lighting, and walls. He even redesigned the pulpit. Several ministries flourished under Reverend Diggs's leadership and the following new ministries were started: Children's church, Singles Ministry, Young Adult Ministry (YAMS), Wednesday night bible study classes for children and youth, and the adult bible study class grew tremendously.

During Reverend William E. Diggs's pastoral service and guidance from the Lord, Turner's Chapel was able to build a new place of worship on the same property in 2008. Reverend Diggs served Turner's Chapel faithfully for 21 years.

In June of 2012, Reverend Michael R. Bowden received his appointment to Turner's Chapel AME Church. Under pastor Bowden's leadership, we expanded our outreach ministry, to just completing the 4th year of feeding 100 families. This outreach ministry was successful with and supplying families with enough food to feed a family of four for 4 days or more at a time. We remodeled the old sanctuary to a fellowship hall, and remodeled the kitchen facilities to accommodate the flourishing growth. Pastor Bowden envisioned the church having a conference room which was constructed in 2016. All this was completely done debt free.

Revered Bowden led Turner's with a powerful spirit filled worship service each Sunday until his passing on February 19, 2019. Today, Presiding Elder Conrad Pridgen, under the direction of our Servant Bishop James L. Davis, is currently the acting pastor of Turner's Chapel A.M.E. Church.

For many people of the Christian faith Easter is the most important holiday of the year. It signifies the end of Lent, new beginnings, and the resurrection of Christ. But what do we really know about Easter? Where did the name Easter come from? Why not call it Resurrection Sunday? Why is it on a Sunday?

Easter used to follow the end of Passover by two days regardless of which day of the week it fell on. That means one year it might be Easter Monday, and the **next, Easter Thursday. However, everyone wasn't pleased with this. It was** determined at *The Council of Nicea* that Easter would always fall on a Sunday, the day Christ rose, and always after the first full moon following the spring equinox.

It is believed that the name Easter was drawn from the pagan god Eostre (pronounced ee-ster). Every spring the pagans would celebrate this deity with a festival. Eostre was the pagan goddess of spring and fertility and such did the festival and season follow.

Rabbits came about through symbolism. While Peter Rabbit had not yet become a thought, during that time period rabbits were the symbol of fertility and new life, hence the derivation of the Easter Bunny.


In early Christianity the Eostre festival occurred around the same time as the Jewish Passover. In efforts to draw more pagans into Christianity church officials decided to embrace some of pagan customs. Neither the rabbit symbolism, not the name were shunned.

The eggs came about around the thirteenth century. In early Christianity the eggs symbolized fertility and renewal. The yolk was said to represent Christ's emergence from the tomb. Eggs were painted red to represent the blood Christ shed on the cross and thus we have the beginning of the painting eggs tradition. It is likely too that the popularity of eggs was due to their absence during lent. For centuries the church put out a banned foods list during lent, on which, one of the banned items was the egg.

Whether it's being called Resurrection Sunday or Easter Sunday, this is undoubtedly a favorite time of the year. The blending of traditions over thousands of years has created an atmosphere both Christians and non-believers alike can enjoy. The early church's goal was to increase the number of believers, and whether you paint your eggs red, rainbow, or don't paint them at all; whether you attend sunrise service on Easter Sunday, or Easter Sunday is the only service you attend all year, you are undeniably being touched by the kingdom of God.
