Reflections of Reverend Richard Allen



Having grown up in the African Methodist Episcopal Church we learned about special days to commemorate, observe and celebrate. One special day that is observed is "Founder's Day" or it may even be called "Allen's Day" commemorating the birth of the founding Father of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, the Right Reverend Richard Allen. Bishop Allen was born on February 14, 1760.

He has been described as one of the most gifted Americans of his generation. In reading an article written by Gary B. Nash, that was published in the A.M.E. Review, he states, at the age of twenty, a few months released from slavery, Richard Allen was preaching to mostly white audiences and converting many of them to Methodism. At the age of 27 he was one of the founders of the Free African Society in Philadelphia. This was the first organization of free Blacks in the United States. Before Allen was 35, he became a spiritual leader of what would grow into Philadelphia's largest congregation, Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church.

Though Allen did not have formal education, he became an accomplished eloquent writer, penning and publishing sermons, tracts, addresses, compiled a hymnal; and drafted articles of organization and governance for various organizations. He lived past his 71st birthday, dying in 1831, leaving a legacy that is remembered and celebrated today.

The second Sunday in February, the A.M.E. Churches celebrate the establishment of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. Picture this scene at St. George's Methodist Episcopal Church, "blacks being pulled off their knees while praying." This incident was instrumental in the formation of Bethel A.M.E. Church. Allen led a small group who resolved to remain Methodist. In 1794, Bethel A.M.E. Church was dedicated with Richard Allen as Pastor. To establish Bethel's independence from interfering white Methodists, Allen, a former Delaware slave, successfully sued in the Pennsylvania courts in 1807 and 1815 for the right of his congregation to exist as an independent institution. Black Methodists in other middle Atlantic communities encountered racism and desired religious autonomy. Allen called them to meet in Philadelphia to form a new Wesleyan denomination, the African Methodist Episcopal.

One of the main objectives for the Lay Organization is to keep the memory of Richard Allen alive. What will you do this second Sunday in February to remember Bishop Richard Allen. If nothing else, share with the members that he is the founder of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

He was elected the church's first bishop in 1816 and published the first Discipline in 1817.

Allen and Absalom Jones started the Free African Society in 1787.

Allen's remains are buried in "Mother" Bethel AME Church, Philadelphia.

Richard Allen, William Paul Quinn, Daniel Alexander Payne and Henry McNeal Turner are called "the Four Horsemen of the Liberation Movement.

Flora Allen (1768-1801) the first wife of Richard Allen and his partner in deeding property to "Mother" Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania in 1799, struggled to move from slavery —through indenture—to freedom in the 1780's and 1790's. They married October 19, 1794 at Old St. George Church. Flora died in 1801.

Richard Allen married Sarah Allen, evidently after 1801.





++Voters will not be required to show photo ID for the March 3, 2020, primary election. In a December 31 order, a federal district court blocked North Carolina's voter photo ID requirement from taking effect. The injunction will remain in place until further order of the court.

2020 PRIMARY ELECTION

North Carolina will hold a Primary Election on Tuesday, March 3rd, 2020.

+In primary elections, voters choose a candidate for each office to represent their party in the General Election in November.

Did you know? Unaffiliated voters can choose in which party's primary they will vote.

How the 2020 Census will invite everyone to respond




Every household will have the option of responding online, by mail, or by phone.

Nearly every household will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census from either a postal worker or a census worker.

9

95% of households will receive their census invitation in the mail.



Almost 5% of households will receive their census invitation when a census taker drops it off. In these areas, the majority of households may not receive mail at their home's physical location (like households that use PO boxes or areas recently affected by natural disasters).



Less than 1% of households will be counted in person by a census taker, instead of being invited to respond on their own. We do this in very remote areas like parts of northern Maine, remote Alaska, and in select American Indian areas that ask to be counted in person.

(This is separate from our follow-up efforts; census takers will visit all households that were invited to respond on their own and haven't.)

Note: We have special procedures to count people who don't five in households, such as students fiving in university housing or people experiencing homelessness.

What to Expect in the Mail

When it's time to respond, most households will receive an invitation in the mail.

Every household will have the option of responding online, by mail, or by phone.

Depending on how likely your area is to respond online, you'll receive either an invitation encouraging you to respond online or an invitation along with a paper questionnaire.

Letter invitation

- Most areas of the country are likely to respond online, so most households will receive a letter asking you to go online to complete the census questionnaire (or to respond by phone).
- We plan on working with the U.S. Postal Service to stagger the delivery of these invitations over several days. This way we can spread out the number of users responding online, and we'll be able to serve you better if you need help over the phone.

Letter Invitation and Paper Questionnaire

 Areas that are less likely to respond online will receive a paper questionnaire along with their invitation. The invitation will also include information about how to respond online or by phone.

- Every household that hasn't already responded will receive reminders and will eventually receive a paper questionnaire.
- It doesn't matter which initial invitation you get or how you get it—we will follow up in person with all households that don't respond.






