For those of us who serve as an officer for the Western North Carolina Conference Lay Organization, we may need to be reminded of our duties and responsibilities. As updates have been made in the <u>Western North</u>



Carolina Conference Lay Organization

<u>Constitution and Bylaws</u> (Article V – Officers), we want to create a corner in the newsletter to keep us abreast of our purpose as an officer for the Lay Organization.

In Article VII – Election of Officers, Section 3. Term Limitation, it states: "The elected officers of the Western North Carolina Conference-Lay Organization, shall serve no more than eight consecutive years in the same office." Regardless of the division of the A.M.E. Church Lay Organization, we have the *Holy Bible*, *The Doctrine and Discipline of the African Methodist Episcopal Church*, and the *Constitution and Bylaws* to keep us abreast of our duties and responsibilities.

#### The office of First Vice President shall:

- Be responsible for Membership Recruitment, Retention/and Coordinate such duties as assigned by the President.
- Assume the complete duties of the President during an absence or when it has been determined by the Executive Board that the President can no longer perform the duties.

#### The office of Second Vice President shall:

- Be responsible for Strategic Planning and coordinate such duties as assigned by the President and the Executive Board and
- Serve in the absence of the President and First Vice President, preside at the meetings and assume all duties of the President.

#### The office of Third Vice President shall:

• Coordinate such duties as Personal Evangelism and coordinating those efforts with the appropriate departments, within the church, and in the absence of the President, First Vice President and Second Vice President preside at the meetings and assume all the duties of the office of President.

CrossRoads 1206 Vaughn Road Burlington, NC 27217 REAL ID requirements will begin on Jan. 22, 2019 at checkpoints, but will be ENFORCED by Transportation Security Administration (TSA) on Oct. 1, 2020 at airport security checkpoints



The N.C. REAL ID will make it more convenient to board a commercial airplane or visit a military base or other federal facility.

Beginning October 2020, federal agencies will ENFORCE tougher security standards at airport check-ins, federal buildings, military installations and nuclear sites.

**Completely optional**, the N.C. REAL ID is just like a traditional license or ID but has a star at the top. Driver licenses and IDs without a gold star are noted "Not for Federal Identification." (see examples below)

A person without an N.C. REAL ID will still be able to board flights or enter federal facilities, but they will have to provide <u>additional documentation</u> with their traditional license or ID.

#### Getting a N.C. REAL ID

Getting a N.C. REAL ID driver license or ID card <u>costs the same as getting any other license or ID for the first time</u>, and the process is similar. <u>First-time drivers</u> must also provide proof of liability insurance to receive a driver license.

Individuals can change a driver license or identification card to an N.C. REAL ID at <u>any time</u>. The cost is the same as a <u>renewal</u>, if the REAL ID is obtained within six months of expiration. A vision test is required, and a new photo will be taken. If the REAL ID is obtained outside of the renewal period, the cost is the same as a duplicate (\$13). A new photo will be taken, but no tests are required.

Visit <u>an N.C. Division of Motor Vehicles driver license office</u> with the <u>required documentation</u>. Download and print the N.C. REAL ID brochure as a reference when collecting your required documents.

N.C. REAL IDs are only available by visiting a driver license office, where an individual's required documents will be scanned and permanently stored, as required under federal law, in the individual's NCDMV record.

# Additional documentation to use with Traditional Driver's License or ID (without a $\bigstar$ )

Adult passengers 18 and over must show valid identification at the airport checkpoint in order to travel.

- Driver's licenses or other state photo identity cards issued by Dept of Motor Vehicles
- U.S. passport OR U.S. passport card
- DHS trusted traveler cards (Global Entry, NEXUS, SENTRI, FAST)
- U.S. Department of Defense ID, including IDs issued to dependents
- Permanent resident card
- Border crossing card
- DHS-designated enhanced driver's license
- Federally recognized, tribal-issued photo ID
- HSPD-12 PIV card
- Foreign government-issued passport
- Canadian provincial driver's license or Indian and Northern Affairs Canada card
- Transportation worker identification credential
- U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services Employment Authorization Card (I-766)
- U.S. Merchant Mariner Credential

A weapon permit is not an acceptable form of identification. A temporary driver's license is not an acceptable form of identification.

#### Children

TSA does not require children under 18 to provide identification when traveling with a companion within the United States. Contact the airline for questions regarding specific ID requirements for travelers under 18.

#### Forgot Your ID?

In the event you arrive at the airport without valid identification, because it is lost or at home, you may still be allowed to fly. The TSA officer may ask you to complete an identity verification process which includes collecting information such as your name, current address, and other personal information to confirm your identity. If your identity is confirmed, you will be allowed to enter the screening checkpoint. You will be subject to additional screening, to include a patdown and screening of carry-on property.

You will not be allowed to enter the security checkpoint if your identity cannot be confirmed, you chose to not provide proper identification, or you decline to cooperate with the identity verification process. *TSA recommends that you arrive at least two hours in advance of your flight time*.




